

Biblical Perspectives on Death & Dying

What happens when we die? This is a question which has confounded philosophers and theologians for millennia. Although Christian belief expresses trust and faith in the resurrection to new life, direct answers are difficult to come by. If anything, scripture offers us only brief

glimpses to this mystery which lies behind the veil. It's even safe to say that there are a variety of perspectives on death that are expressed in scripture, depending on the time and cultural circumstances in which the author(s) lived. Nevertheless, this does not mean that scripture cannot offer us guidance on these weighty matters. By examining passages from the Old and New Testaments which deal specifically with death and dying (with additional insight through the interpretive lens of our theological tradition), perhaps we can gain a clearer understanding into this mystery of all mysteries.

We will be having a Water Day in the next couple weeks. If anyone has a water table, sprinkler, pool, or any other fun water activities we can borrow, please let us know.


We are still trying to reach out to the Library to set up a schedule for a librarian to come visit.

MISSION COMMITTEE

PLEASE PRAY for the Middle East

I grew up with a party telephone line and an operator who asked, “Number please?” and a bit later a rotary dial that required only four digits to reach my friends. Therefore, it still amazes me that I can talk to our missionary in Lebanon by email. Let me share with you a June 9th message from Elmarie Parker.

First, Elmarie expressed her gratitude for our financial support of their missions and for her visit with us at First Pres in January. We gathered informally at Joyce Tipton’s home Saturday night. On Sunday she joined the conversation in Myra’s Sunday school class, delivered a sermon at our 11 a.m. service, and talked briefly to those who stayed for lunch. She and her husband Scott visited fifteen states and spoke to sixty churches or groups before returning home to Lebanon in April. On a personal note, she asked for prayers for her father who has congestive heart failure and for Scott’s continuing sessions of Strong Kids, Strong Emotions with Syrian refugees. As PCUSA Regional Liaison to Iraq, Syria, and Lebanon, Mrs. Parker made specific requests for prayers for those three countries. Following please find a synopsis of her suggestions for our prayers:

For Iraq: Because of tensions between the U.S. government and Iran, Iraqis are caught in the middle. The United States has withdrawn “non-essential” embassy and consulate personnel, a decision that limits aid workers and funds designated to help Iraqi Christians. Please pray for their resilience and peace through the Holy Spirit and the wisdom needed to walk in the ways of Christ during these ongoing challenges.

For Syria: Although the security situation for many Syrians has improved because of USA’s sanctions, there are now severe fuel shortages that require waits of up to twelve hours for heating and transportation petrol. Inflation has escalated and food prices and availability have made it hard for workers, even if they can get to work, to feed their families. Rev. Joseph Kaasab of the Synod of Syria and Lebanon recently commented, “We are finding that many of our international partners are more interested in building projects than in the continuing relief work that is needed. But if we don’t care for the people, there will be no people to utilize rebuilt church buildings and homes.” Please pray for the Syrians and the Iraqis (and for our mission wisdom as well... added by me).

For Lebanon: Delay in governmental decisions has caused economic pressures on all families in Lebanon and social pressures on Syrian families seeking refuge in Lebanon to return to Syria. Please pray for the people of Lebanon for wisdom for those involved in decision-making processes as well as for resilience, peace, and wisdom through the Holy Spirit while they walk with Christ.

CHURCH PARKING

It has come to our attention that people are parking in “yellow zones” on 11th Street adjacent to church property, i.e., where curbs are painted yellow. The Waynesboro Police Department has confirmed that yellow zones are “No parking” zones 24 hours a day, seven days a week and violators risk being ticketed. This illegal parking has become a habit for many people who, perhaps, have been unaware of this violation.

In a related issue, please note the following: While open for unrestricted parking Monday-Saturday, BOTH sides of 11th Street between Wayne and Chestnut are reserved for handicapped parking on Sunday mornings. Please honor these zones on Sundays to assist those who need these spaces for physical reasons, rather than using them as a matter of convenience.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session held a Stated Meeting on June 10, 2019.

Commissioner Mark Henderson reported on the Shenandoah Presbytery May 21. In conjunction with the presbytery's decision to emphasize work of anti-racism this year, discussion was held on Debby Irving's book "Waking Up White".

The Church Nominating Committee presented its slate for the Congregational Meeting called for June 30, 2019, after the 11:00 worship service to elect new church officers.

PFC workers at Disciples' Kitchen on May 28 served 75 meals plus take-outs. Included were many homeless people. Sandwiches (pb & j plus ham) were sent home with the hungrier-than-usual crowd. Next FPC service dates are July 23 and September 3.

On June 12 Food Bank workers will be trained on a computer provided for use in ordering and for checking in clients.

Springdale contributions are once again welcome.

Session approved hiring Max Daggy to electronically catalogue the Music Library.

Session authorized funds up to \$1,000 for the purchase of a laptop/table computer for the Music Department.

Session approved the summer worship schedule: Regular services (8:45 & 11:00) through July; one service (11:00) only for the month of August through the week after Rally Day (September 8).

George thanked outgoing elders Cary Bennett, Jeannie Curry and Betty Dixon for the outstanding service and dedication to First Presbyterian Church.

All Session meetings are opened and closed with prayer.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

June 9, 2019

A Congregational Meeting was held after the 11:00 worship service on June 9 for the purpose of approving a bid for the renovation/modification of the pulpit. A quorum was present.

Elder Cary Bennet for the Pulpit Committee summarized the work of that committee this past year. A comprehensive "Pulpit Committee Summary Report" and "Pulpit Renovation Specifications Sheet" had been made available. Cary described in detail the changes desired and offered two options for the railings.

The following MOTION was made, seconded, and voted upon favorably: Accept the proposal in the amount of \$7,500 for Renovation of the Pulpit.

All Congregational meetings are opened and closed with prayer.



ASSOCIATE GENERAL PRESBYTER REV. NANCY MEEHAN YAO
PREACHED AT FPC ON JUNE 23

Pulpit Supply on June 23 was Rev. Nancy Meehan Yao who serves Shenandoah Presbytery as Associate General Presbyterian. A graduate of Columbia Theological Seminary, she has served as co-pastor (with her husband, Rev. Jim Yao), temporary supply and interim pastor to churches in the Finger Lakes region of New York State.

In her introductory remarks she talked about change and how nobody really likes change. We don't even like having things moved around at the grocery store! She went on to say that change is what God is calling us to do. I knew right then that whatever else she said would resonate with me!

Her sermon entitled "The Widow's Mite" was based on Mark 12:38-44, 13:1-2. We all know the story of the poor woman who gave her all. But do we recall as clearly the rest of the passage? The teachers of religion love to wear the robes of the rich and scholarship....they love to sit in the best seats in the synagogues and at places of honor at banquets. Jesus said to beware of these folks! I couldn't help feeling that I kind of like these things, too! In the last two verses (13:1-2) one of the disciples was admiring the beautiful buildings. Jesus replied that someday not one stone will be left upon another except as ruins.

I admire the widow and what she stands for. But do I not perhaps put too much emphasis on our church building?

Rev. Yao reported on her visit to Ethiopia last fall. Shenandoah Presbytery (ours!) has had a long and productive mission partnership with Illubabor Bethel Synod, in the Illubabor region of Ethiopia. She said that she knew intellectually there would be poverty but seeing it - conditions that are preventable - was an entirely different experience.

She mentioned the Gore Home, an orphanage housing approximately 125 students. This caught the attention of many in the congregation as FPC has supported two students there ever since the program began in 1999. iCARE (Illubabor Children's Agape REsponse) scholarships are designed to support the child until leaving that school.

The church is thriving in Ethiopia. Churches are expanding their physical plants, if possible. Others set up seats and loudspeakers outside for the overflow. What is different and why are they growing? Some of the preachers expound on the Prosperity Gospel, i.e. God gives financial rewards in exchange for offerings. We have seen that premise delivered on many a TV program in the U.S. Illubabor Bethel Synod is trying to discourage such a message seen as a con game on vulnerable people. God places us in a particular time and place for a reason. What do we need to change, to let go of?

I listened thoughtfully to Rev. Yao's sermon on Sunday. I listened again on the FPC website www.firstpres.com This article is my summary of what I gleaned from her message. Do yourself a favor - watch the worship service and experience it all yourself.




