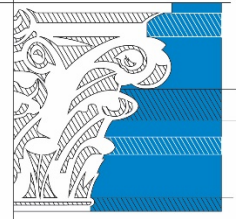
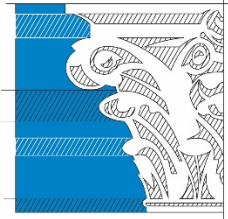

MUSIC NOTES



Here we are in the heart of the summer, listening to the birds sing, feeling the warmth of the sun and seeing the lightning bugs (aka fireflies) rise from the grass at dusk. These beauties of the season continue to remind us of the glories of God's creation.

How we look forward to seeing you again in person someday! But in lieu of getting together face to face, you will at least see and hear services from our lovely Sanctuary, beginning this month.

Sunday 5 July is the final combined Waynesboro Presbyterian online service. We are so grateful to Rev. April Cranford at Westminster for spearheading the efforts to provide worship services during the pandemic. For over three months, Presbyterians from FPC, Second, Westminster, Smyrna and Hermitage have contributed to the services each week. This unified effort has served so many who have been worshipping at home. We have been honored - and humbled - to have coordinated the musical aspects of these services. Our gratitude extends to Director of Music at Westminster, Bettie Tindall, organist, Sue Wright and their associates. Our own Cathy Cunningham and Paul Jones added their gifts. Glenn Fields from Second Presbyterian also provided music. We are fortunate that FPC elder Jen Jones will provide the musical offering for the first Sunday of July, *Let There Be Peace on Earth*. And since it is the day after Independence Day, patriotic music will be part of the service. The McHale Duo (Micheal Hogeson and Justina Nadal) which has contributed music to several services, will provide the anthem, the Daggys will sing *America the Beautiful* for the closing hymn and Roger will play *The Star-Spangled Banner* for the postlude.

Starting on Sunday 12 July, FPC will present online services recorded in our Sanctuary with social distancing measures in place. The Chair of the Worship Committee, Joyce Tipton, has engaged Rev. Wray Sherman to initially lead services. The music, liturgy and sermon will all be recorded separately by Craig Cavanaugh, who will then work his magic to put the services together. The amount of effort required to bring these services to our website is immense. It always takes much longer to record something than to "do it live," and Craig is to be commended for all that he brings to this work. Thank you, Craig! Bruce Bosselman will ensure that the services will be posted on the FPC website by Sunday morning.

For 12 July, Rev. Sherman has chosen the parable of the Sower. With sowing and reaping in mind, we will include the hymn *For the Fruits of this Creation* in our first video FPC service. The theme of opening ourselves to the word of the Lord continues with the hymn *Open My Eyes, That I May See*.

The following Sunday, 19 July, Rev. Sherman will preach on Jacob's Ladder, from Genesis 28:10-19a, so the service will, of course, include the spiritual *Jacob's Ladder*. The passage from Genesis also includes the text "Surely the presence of the Lord is in this place," and Lanny Wolfe's rendition of God's word, composed in 1977, will be part of that Sunday's musical offerings.

Please let us know what you think of the online video services. They are a work in progress and, like so much in life, can benefit from the observations of others!

May you find peace in the love of God during these uncertain times.

JULY 4 - FEDERAL HOLIDAY IN HONOR OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

The Declaration of Independence was an official act taken by all 13 American colonies in declaring independence from British rule. It was originally written by Thomas Jefferson, but Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Jefferson then worked together to make changes. A final draft was adopted on July 4, 1776, but the actual signing of the final document took place on August 2, 1776.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Some Fourth of July History

- July 4, 1776 - Jefferson noted in his "Weather Memorandum Book" that the weather was cloudy, the temperature 76 degrees.
- July 4, 1826 - Both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, signers of the Declaration of Independence who each later became president, died on the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the declaration.
- July 4, 1884 - The Statue of Liberty was formally presented to the U.S. by France.
- July 4, 1911 - It was a hot Fourth of July in New England. All-time state records were set in Nashua, NH (106) and Vernon, VT (105).

Some Fourth of July Trivia

- Why is the name "John Hancock" synonymous with "your signature?" Hancock's bold signature on the Declaration of Independence dwarfed the signature of the other signers. Legend says Hancock wanted the king of England to see the rebellious signature without having to wear his spectacles!
- How many people signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4? Only 2 - John Hancock, president of the Congress, and Charles Thompson, secretary of the Congress.
- What day did most people sign? August 7, 1776.
- When did Independence Day become a national holiday? 1938
- Where is the Declaration of Independence document today? Jefferson's original draft was lost. The one eventually signed is the "engrossed" document kept at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., for all to see. Of the 200 printed versions made, only 27 are accounted for. One of these was found in the back of a picture frame at a tag sale and sold at auction for \$8.14 million to television producer Norman Lear. It has travelled the country to be displayed to the public.
- Where was George Washington when the Declaration of Independence was written? He was in New York with his troops. On July 9 he received his copy with a note from John Hancock telling him to share the news with his soldiers. They were so excited that they rushed over to the Bowling Green and tore down the statue of King George III. Shortly after this, the British, as Washington expected, attacked the colonists and the American Revolution was under way. The colonists fought eight long, hard years (1775-1783) for their independence from Britain.

After the war was over, Washington hoped he could retire and return to Mt. Vernon. Instead, in 1789, the electors unanimously voted him the first president of the United States. Because it was such an honor and he felt a great duty to his country, he accepted. Members of his first Cabinet included Thomas Jefferson as secretary of state and Alexander Hamilton as secretary of the treasury.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

A Stated Session Meeting was held June 9, 2020, via Zoom.

- Note. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, church services and most meetings have been cancelled, our Preschool is closed, and all activities are “on hold” until further notice as people are self-isolated.
- Moderator Sarah Wolf from Covenant PC in Staunton opened and closed the meeting with prayer.
- Session charged Preschool Principal Thomas Sheffey and his staff to come up with a plan for reopening our Preschool.
- Small Business Administration Payroll Protection Program Loan: The loan/grant of \$18,800 has been received.
- Bagged lunches continue to be available to clients at Disciples’ Kitchen. Groceries are delivered to the cars of FPC Food Bank clients, whose number is increasing.
- The P&M Committee is pursuing options to replace the boiler.
- No worship services have been held since March 8. A Presbyterian audio online service including FPC participants will continue through June (later changed - through July 5).
- FPC plans to begin Sunday services on our website starting July 12.
- Session accepted a gift from Dana Quillen of her mother’s baby grand piano. This piano will replace the one in the Barksdale Room which will be moved upstairs to the Waynesboro Symphony Orchestra storage area.
- Session approved refunding \$700 to the Symphony for rehearsal space.
- Session approved forwarding the June 5 letter on Racism from Presbytery to church members. Jen Jones volunteered to write a cover letter.
- The Interim Search Committee will restart its search.

PRESBYTERY & GENERAL ASSEMBLY NEWS

Shenandoah Presbytery held a short practice meeting by Zoom on June 30. This was in preparation for a regular Presbytery meeting via Zoom on August 22. A pre-recorded worship service preceded some voting and announcements and the meeting was adjourned in 38 minutes.

The 224th General Assembly was conducted online June 19, 26 & 27. The theme was “From Lament to Hope” and the meeting focused on Lamentations 5:20-21: “Why do you forget us forever? Why do you forsake us for so long? Turn us around and bring us back to you again! That is our only hope! Give us back the joys we used to have!”

Almighty and everlasting God,

We know that you are good, that you are trustworthy, that you are generous, that you are loving and that you are holy. These attributes describe a God in whom we put our faith.

But Lord, right now we face a double pandemic: One pandemic virus infects our health and is permeating our world; another pandemic is a virus of racism and bigotry that permeates our nation. Violence in our world reflects a broken social contract in our country.

WHO WAS RUTH METZEL?

You may have noticed that recently Ruth Metzel has been on our Kneeling Notes. When I was advised that she had died, I decided to check out this lady and find out why her name was so familiar.

Ruth Patterson Phipps Metzel was a retired career mission worker with the PC(USA) and resided with her husband, Bill, at Sunnyside Presbyterian Community in Harrisonburg. She died March 21, 2020, at the age of 93.

Ruth was born in Princeton, WV, but grew up in Waynesboro! She had a brother, the late Rev. William “Bill” Phipps, and a sister LaVelle. Yes, our own member LaVelle Phipps Pool. We haven’t seen Lavelle recently, but she was a regular on Monday mornings in the Receptionist Office for many years. (I chat occasionally with her son who works at Kroger.) A celebration of Ruth’s life will be held later at Mount Horeb Presbyterian Church in Grottoes where her father, the Rev. Charles Henry Phipps, pastored for 20 years.

Another connection with FPC is the William Sheppard Memorial Scholarship Fund established by the Metzels in 1964. This scholarship honors the distinguished missionary to the Congo (1890) who grew up in Waynesboro and had worked as a janitor at FPC. The Fund assists black students in educational pursuits.

The Metzels served in the Congo for more than 30 years. Ruth’s honorary Tshiuba name translates as “a person of compassion and love for all people.” Besides teaching high school math, she started projects to teach women sewing, reading and writing. She helped in running girls’ dormitories so they could go to school. The Metzels established a home and school for homeless street children as volunteers, returning to Congo when they were in their 70s to get these projects going.

Back in the states the Metzels were called to churches in Winchester, Petersburg and Westfield, NC. Bill served as pastor and Ruth was a strong partner for Christian Education, visitation and hospitality. They retired to Richmond before moving to Sunnyside.

I’ve enjoyed researching this remarkable lady and feel almost as though I knew her. I wish I had!

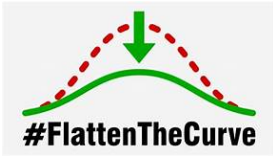

To keep virus free.

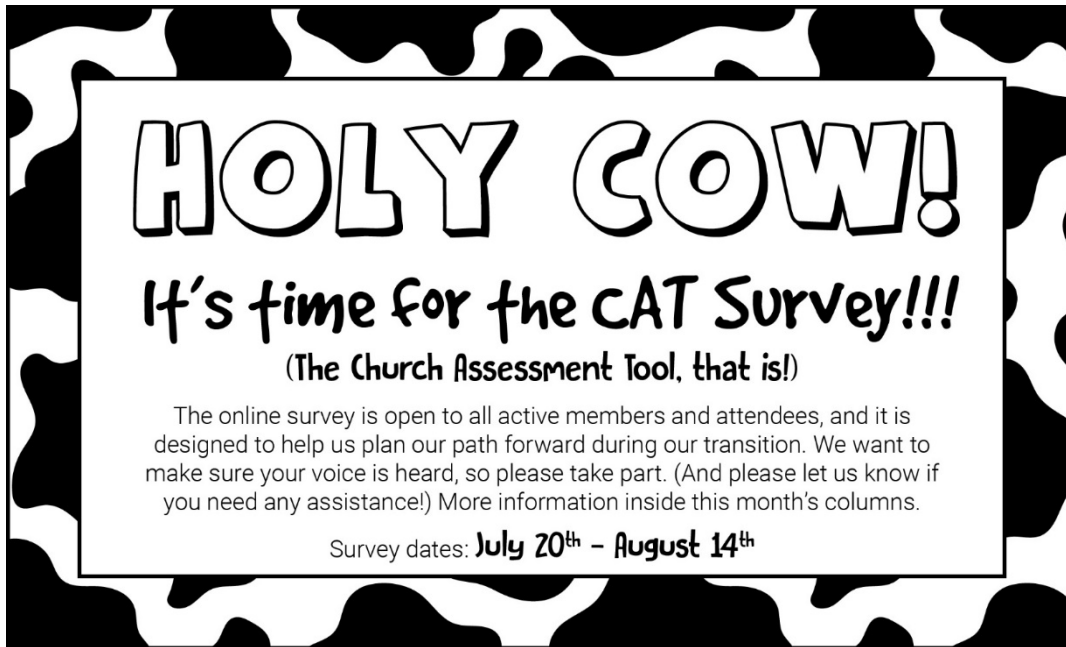
Stop touching your face, Grace,

You don't need more TP!

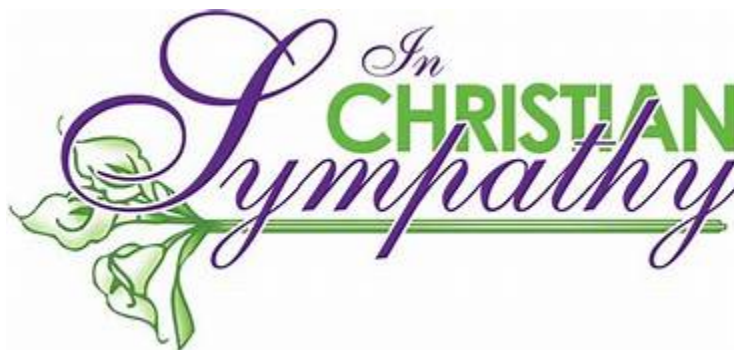
This isn't Spring Break, Jake,
