**Today concludes the audio worship services led by the Presbyterian churches in Waynesboro, Virginia, as many churches resume in person services along with providing worship services online.

Let us pause to reflect with gratitude on the Waynesboro Presbyterian worship services over the last three months:

- We have moved through the seasons of Lent and Easter together. We have felt the Holy Spirit alive in our homes on Pentecost. We have entered the season of ordinary time in a not so ordinary way.
- -We have prayed for many to receive healing during the pandemic and for our nation to move toward healing in racial equality.
- -We have listened in the home, in the car, or on walks in God's creation to sixteen Sunday worship services and one Maundy Thursday service.
- -The seventeen services have received over 2,000 listeners creating an average virtual worship attendance of 120 per service.
- -More than ten people each week spent time compiling the bulletin, piecing together the audio links and posting the information on the various church websites.
- -Since March 22, over thirty musicians, three pastors, three teachers and four elders, led liturgy apart in their homes and churches yet together in worship.
- Lastly, the services received funds totalling \$272 from the Shenandoah Presbytery's worship innovation grant which established the Soundcloud account and a donation of \$200 to the Presbyterian Outlook for the outstanding liturgy provided each week to enhance the worship services.
