

## 10 FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT THE LABOR DAY HOLIDAY

The first Monday in September is celebrated nationally as Labor Day. The Labor Day holiday grew out of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century organized labor movement, and it quickly became a national holiday as the labor movement assumed a prominent role in American society. Here is how it all started with the facts, as we know them, supplied by the Labor Department, the Library of Congress, and other sources.

- 1. The idea first became public in 1882. In September 1882, the unions of New York City decided to have a parade to celebrate their members being in unions and to show support for all unions. At least 20,000 people were there. Workers had to give up a day's pay to attend. There was also a lot of beer involved in the event
- 2. The New York parade inspired other unions. By 1887 Oregon, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey and Colorado had made Labor Day a state holiday.
- 3. How did the Haymarket Affair influence Labor Day? On May 4, 1886, a bomb exploded at a union rally in Chicago's Haymarket Square, which led to violence. This incident led to May 1 being celebrated in most nations as Workers Day. New York unions had already chosen the first Monday in September as their holiday and the U.S. government agreed.
- 4. Two people with similar names are credited with that first New York City event.

  Matthew Maguire, a machinist, and Peter McGuire, a carpenter, have been linked to the 1882 parade.

  The men were from rival unions.
- 5. Grover Cleveland helped make Labor Day a national holiday. After violence related to the Pullman railroad strike, President Cleveland and lawmakers in Washington wanted a federal holiday to celebrate labor and not a holiday celebrated on May 1. Cleveland signed an act in 1894 establishing the federal holiday.
- **6.** The holiday has evolved over the years. In the late 19<sup>th</sup> century celebrations focused on parades in urban areas. Now the holiday is celebrated with fewer parades and more activities. It also marks the end of the perceived summer season.
- 7. Can you wear white after Labor Day? This old tradition goes back to the Victorian era where it was a fashion faux pas to wear any white clothing after the summer officially ended on Labor Day. The tradition isn't really followed any more.
- 8. Labor Day is the official end of Hot Dog season. The National Hot Dog and Sausage Council says that between Memorial Day and Labor Day, Americans will eat 7 billion hot dogs.
- 9. How many people are union members today? According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, there were 14.8 million union members in the workforce in 2017. There were 17.7 million in 1983.
- 10. What is the biggest union today? The National Education Association has about 3 million people who are members, including inactive and lifetime members.

#### **SESSION HIGHLIGHTS**

Session held a Stated Session Meeting via Zoom on August 11, 2020.

Clerk's Report: Clerk sent letters of appreciation on behalf of the Session to participants in online worship services – Rev. April Cranford, Rev. Wray Sherman, Rev. Henry Scoggins, Craig Cavanaugh, Linda and Glenn Fields, and Roger and Kimberlea Daggy; Clerk sent email welcome to Rev. Pettit.

Preschool: There are now 11 students in Summer School. 21 have signed up for the fall semester which begins September 14. Nate has done an outstanding job painting the outdoor equipment and planting a garden. There is a new Preschool banner.

Budget & Finance: Session approved setting up online Giving through the Presbyterian Foundation. There is a 2% transaction fee.

Christian Education: Books for PW are not yet available. Colleen prepared Goody Bags for Amber and Miley.

Mission: Members stepped up to provide breakfast for WARM clients at the Day's Inn for a week. WARM is working to organize long term housing for clients and has found apartments for twelve.

P&M: Session approved installation of a new boiler and removal of old. Schedule for this year's Grounds Upkeep is OK. Additional help may be needed next year. Weeds have been sprayed with a homeopathic weed killer.

Worship: No in-church worship services have been held since March 8, 2020. The local Presbyterian online services concluded July 5. FPC Sunday video services began on our website July 12 led by Rev. Wray Sherman. Roger Daggy has coordinated musical offerings.

Interim Pastor Search Committee: Rev. Patrick Pettit was approved as our interim pastor, effective September 1, at the Presbytery CPT meeting on August 4.

CAT Team: The CAT survey has been distributed; deadline is August 14. Results will be tabulated and results interpreted by Rev. Malcolm Brownlee. Scheduled dates for the CAT Team to discuss results with Session are August 25 and September 1.

Session approved a Celebration of Life Service for Bill Bare in the sanctuary on July 30 for immediate family, Rev. Albert Connette officiating. Proper covid-19 protocols will be followed.

Session renewed the Covenant Agreement with the Waynesboro Symphony Orchestra.

The meeting was opened and closed with prayer by Moderator Rev. Sarah Wolf.

## 186th STATED PRESBYTERY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The presbytery had 129 folks on our first zoom presbytery meeting! There were a few bumps, but a good job was done by all. Thank you to TE Rachel Crumley and TE Kate Rascoe for organizing a meaningful worship experience. We welcomed David Staninus from the Presbyterian Historical Society who gave a short reminder of what the historical society does for us as a denomination.

We welcomed Martha Reisner from the Board of Pensions who gave us an update on what the Board has to offer in 2021. We heard the report from our General Assembly Commissioners.

We elected more folks to committees of the Presbytery. We passed an additional statement concerning Black women and Girls to be added to the General Assembly's "Responding to the Sin of Racism and a Call to Action". Our statement will be sent to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, the Rev. J. Herbert Nelson, and will be circulated to our congregations.

The Committee on Church Vitality and Transformation (CCVT) welcomed representatives from Trinity Presbyterian Church in Harrisonburg to share what they have been doing during this unusual time of the pandemic.

We passed the recommendations from the Committee on Relational Ministry to update the Sabbatical Policy for installed pastors and the Salary Policy for Installed Pastors.

A special thank you to our Moderator RE Rick Comstock for keeping us on course, to our chair of the Coordinating and Planning Commission TE Rachel Crumley for volunteering to take us through how to participate in the meeting and to RE Donna Lanaghan, the communications director for the presbytery who put in extra time to make this meeting possible. Well done good and faithful servants!

Our next stated meeting is Tuesday November 17, 2020 and currently is scheduled to be by zoom.

The COVID-19 pandemic has definitely placed a new set of obstacles to overcome and led to the rise of uncertainty and a "new normal".
