Remembering Lucy Craft Laney.

Lucy Craft Laney (1854-1933) was a Presbyterian educator who founded the first school for black children in Augusta, Georgia. For fifty years, she served as principal of *The Haines Institute for Industrial and Normal Education*.

Born free in Macon Georgia eleven years before emancipation (her parents had purchased their freedom), Laney was a prodigy: she could read and write at the age of four, and by age 12, she

was translating Latin. Laney trained as a teacher at Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University), then worked as a teacher for ten years before returning to Augusta to start her own school in the basement of Christ Presbyterian Church.

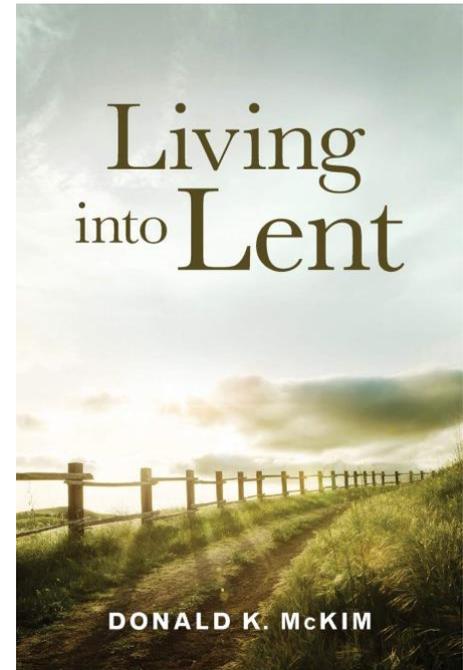

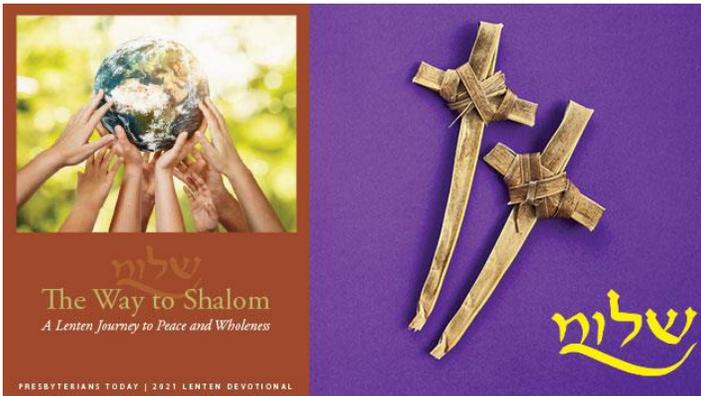

Music Notes for February 7.

This Sunday is both Valentine's Day and the celebration of the Transfiguration of Jesus, and the music reflects the power of the light of Christ, as we mark the final worship service prior to the season of Lent.

The opening hymn, *Open My Eyes that I May See*, asks the Spirit to dwell in us so that the light may shine forth in our words and deeds. The anthem, *We are Marching in the Light of God (Siyahamba)*, originally a Zulu folk song, was set as a Christian hymn in the 1950s by Andries Van Tonder, and later became an anthem in the South African anti-Apartheid movement. The closing hymn, *I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light*, was composed in the summer of 1966 by organist/composer Kathleen Thomerson (b.1934). She called the tune *Houston* after visiting the Church of the Redeemer in that coastal city in Texas. May the light of Christ shine through you during these challenging times!

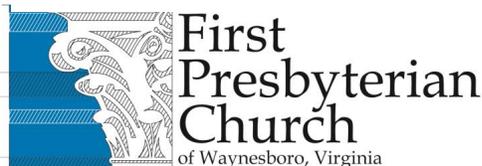

Her first class in 1883 had six students, but interest within the African-American community quickly grew, and by the end of the second year, the school had 234 students. With the increase in students, she needed more funding for her operation, so in 1886, she asked the Northern Presbyterian Church Convention for support. She was given only enough money for her train fare home, but her speech inspired Francine E.H. Haines, president of the Women's Department of the Presbyterian Church, to donate \$10,000 (about \$277,000 today). Haines would become a lifetime benefactor of the school, which would be named in her honor. The school quickly outgrew the church basement, and eventually spanned an entire city block of buildings; by 1928, at a time when public education was still segregated, the school's enrollment was more than 800 students.

Laney participated in the Niagara Movement, and in 1918 helped to organize the local chapter of the the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

She was active in many organizations dedicated to the welfare of blacks and black women, and helped to integrate the community work engaged in by the YMCA and YWCA, both of which offered separate organizations for whites and blacks.

In 1974, Governor Jimmy Carter selected Laney as one of the first three African Americans honored by having their portraits hung in the Georgia State Capitol. Her portrait bears tribute to *the mother of the children of the people, a woman who knew God didn't use any different dirt to make me than the first lady of the land.*
