

- Our new moderator was installed, Ruling Elder Judy Hensley who did a terrific job moderating her first
 meeting on Zoom! We thanked outgoing moderator Ruling Elder Rick Comstock, but he continues in
 service to the presbytery as the new chair of the Coordinating and Planning Commission.
- We received an update from our Church consultant, Martha Reisner of the Board of Pensions. It is always good to see her and she always comes with much information to share.
- The Committee on Educational Resources asks you to save the date of September 17, 2021 in hopes that
 we can come together in the Big Event. If you have suggestions for a keynote speaker, please contact
 Nancy Meehan Yao with your suggestions.
- The Committee on Church Vitality and Transformation had Rosalea Potter of the Collierstown
 Presbyterian Church share about the Educational POD ministry they have been involved with since the
 beginning of the pandemic, helped by a grant from the committee.
- We welcomed Cindy Correll, our missionary to Haiti. She gave a full report concerning the issues in Haiti, thanked everyone for the continued support of her work and the people of Haiti and offered herself as a speaker to any of our congregations.
- During the time of intercessory prayer, we remembered those who died in 2020 that served as Ruling Elders and Teaching Elders in our Presbytery.
- The Committee on Pastoral Transition introduced and welcomed Teaching Elder Alexa Smith, Interim pastor for Berkeley Springs. The Committee on Preparation for Ministry reported on the Readers for Ordination exams. The Committee on Relational Ministry introduced and welcomed Retired Teaching Elder Jim Johns into the presbytery. He looks forward to being active in the life of the presbytery.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session held a Stated Session Meeting via Zoom on March 9, 2021.

- The Clerk submitted 2019 and 2020 Session Minutes Checklists by email to Presbytery per their request.
- Betsy Ruehl, Commissioner to the Presbytery Meeting February 27 by Zoom, presented highlights of the meeting. A summary appears in the article above.
- Session approved holding an in-person worship service in the Sanctuary on Easter Sunday, if the COVID-19 numbers allow. Benchmarks are COVID-19 cases average per week are below 10/100K.
- The Preschool has been awarded a \$12,900 grant.
- Session approved Preschool's subscribing to the Brightwheel Management System which will assist with tuition payments, check-in, and emailing parents among other things.
- The Preschool is prepared to accept additional students for the summer and fall programs.
- The Mission Committee is promoting collecting money to provide CWS Buckets for Disaster Relief, a program sponsored by Shenandoah Presbytery.
- The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering will be received on Easter Sunday.
- There are a great number of problems with the physical plant of the church.
- Short visual services are being held each Wednesday during Lent on YouTube with different pastors participating. A Maundy Thursday service will be recorded or mainstreamed.
- A new cross will be in place on Good Friday. Congregants are encouraged to bring flowers for the cross on Easter Sunday.

All Session meetings are opened and closed with prayer.

PROCEDURES FOR IN PERSON WORSHIP

- Everyone must wear a mask. If you need one, masks will be at a hygiene station in the narthex, along with hand sanitizer, tissues, and no-touch trash cans.
- Stationary collection boxes will be available in the narthex.
- No bulletins will be handed out, but worship information will be included in the midweek email.
- To maintain social distancing, every other pew will be closed, and markers in the open pews will denote six feet intervals. Individual worshippers and family groups should remain at least 6 feet apart from one another.
- Please refrain from shaking hands, hugging, or kissing each other.
- For the time being, the congregation won't be singing or reading responsively.
- To minimize risk, we will do our best to limit the length of the service to 30 minutes.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING SPECIAL OFFERING

One Great Hour of Sharing is a multi-denominational offering that makes the love of Christ real for individuals and communities around the world who suffer the effects of disaster, conflict, or severe economic hardship, and for those who serve them through gifts of money and time. Today efforts are underway in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada. While specific allocations differ in each denomination, all use their One Great Hour of Sharing funds to make possible disaster relief, refugee assistance, development aid and more.

PC(USA) directs One Great Hour of Sharing offerings to three specific ministries of the church.

OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA)

PDA is the emergency and refugee program of the PC(USA). PDA enables congregations and mission partners of the PC(USA) to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crisis and catastrophic event.

Presbyterian Hunger Program

Fighting hunger is at the heart of our Presbyterian understanding of mission. Jesus fed the hungry and told his disciples to do the same. The mission of the Presbyterian Hunger Program is to alleviate hunger and eliminate its causes.

Self-Development of People

Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People is a ministry that affirms God's concern for humankind. They are Presbyterian and ecumenical partners dissatisfied with poverty and oppression, united in faith and action through sharing, confronting, and enabling by participating in the empowerment of economically poor, oppressed, and disadvantaged people, seeking to change the structures that perpetuate poverty, oppression and injustice.

FPC FOOD BANK TO BE OPEN ONCE EVERY WEEK

By partnering with Westminster Presbyterian Church, we will be able to open our Food Bank two more days each month. Our church will still operate the Food Bank on the second and fourth Thursdays. Westminster will open the Food Bank on the first and third Thursdays of the month.

The volunteers from Westminster are excited to expand the ministry and will offer evening hours from 6PM-8PM. This will allow working families a chance to receive

necessary pantry items.

Our congregation will order and shelve pantry items with an emphasis on fresh produce and protein sources such as fish, chicken, and beef. Milk, eggs, bread, and butter are made available too.

The folks from Westminster will start April 15, 2021. I will continue to coordinate activities but will step back as they become accustomed to the routine.

I remain thankful for the continued support from the members of First Presbyterian Church for the Food Bank. Members have donated stimulus checks, tons of toilet paper, personal care products and cereal. Our pantry workers are unwavering in their dedication to serving our community. Last month we served 95 individuals and 35 households. I hope these numbers will increase with more days and new opening hours.
