Music Notes for this week.

The Lord is My Shepherd, I Shall Not Want.




St. Columba.

Those familiar words open Psalm 23, the first lesson in this week's worship service. Scores of pieces have been written on the comforting text, including the hymns *My Shepherd Will Supply My Need* and *The King of Love My Shepherd Is*. Both hymns are based on folk tunes.


The tune for *The King of Love My Shepherd Is*, ST. COLUMBA,

honors the monk and Evangelist who brought Irish Christianity to Scotland. It is one of many Irish tunes collected by George Petrie (1789-1866) and included in various publications, such as *Hymns Ancient and Modern* in 1868 and *The English Hymnal* of 1906.

My Shepherd Will Supply My Need comes from an anonymous Appalachian melody.





The tune, initially known as *Hopewell*, first appeared in 1828 in *The Beauties of Harmony*. A few years later, the tune was renamed *Resignation* for the 1832 publication *Genuine Church Music*. The hymn was also widely disseminated in William "Singin' Billy" Walker's *Southern Harmony*, first published in 1835 and revised in 1840, 1847 and 1854. By 1867, Walker claimed that over 600,000 copies of the hymnal had been sold.
